Brother John Madura '12 Makes US Olympic Rowing Team

Brother John Madura '12, now at the University of California Berkeley for his PhD in mechanical engineering, will travel to Trakai, Lithuania to compete in the 2012 World Rowing Under 23 Championships. Madura earned his spot on the 2012 United States Under 23 National Rowing during trials racing on Mercer Lake in West Windsor, NJ. "Representing US Rowing Sculling Camp out of Norwalk, CT, Madura and his partner Matthew Schanck (Brownstown, MI), a recent graduate of Northeastern, recently clocked a 6:33.930 during trials racing on Mercer Lake in West Windsor, NJ. The time placed the pair second in a competitive field and earned the World Championship berth as the winning duo is also competing for a spot on a guad boat. This marks the

straight year a WPI studentathlete will compete at U23 Worlds as Hank Moore '11 (Jaffrey, NH) participated in the 2010 and 2011 championships in Amsterdam and Belarus respectively and Ben John-(Northford, CT) and Tobin McGee (Rye, NY) '10 rowed at the 2010 event... Madura also won Elite Nationals in the heavyweight quad while Holak was third in the four without a coxswain behind the US Olympic lightweight four and the US U23 four.(http:// athletics.wpi.edu/sports/ mrowing/2012-13/ releases/20120702be7f6h)." John Madura has an extensive resume being a member of Tau Beta Pi, Pi Tau Omega, Order of Omega, Skull, and ASME and was a recipient of the Salisbury Prize and the Norton Fellowship during his time at WPI.

Brothers Chris Scangas '17 and Pat Gates '17 Help Move Fire Code

On March 26th 2014, firefighters Michael Kennedy and Lt. Edward Walsh passed away in a nine-alarm blaze in Boston's back bay. During the fire their hose line burnt through, not supplying them with water at the nozzle. Michael Kennedy's mother, Kathy Crosby Bell, started the last call foundation in honor of her son. The first grant went to the WPI fire protection department to improve the fire attack hose so that fire fighters are properly protected with a working fire house during a fire.

Last year, Brothers Chris Scangas '17 and Patrick Gates '17 were on the IQP team that launched the first ever data base to record burn-throughs across the country. Over the last year, they recorded over 170 burn-throughs nation-wide and rose awareness of the possibility of fire attack hoses burning through during fires.

Recently, Scangas traveled to Atlanta, Georgia where the IQP team drove the NFPA 1961 committee to change national code and make fire hose tests more rigorous to represent the actual conditions of the fire ground. Through hard work and persistence, the brothers efforts are going to protect firefighters lives across the country.



FIJI Brothers' Internships

The house is filled with a very diverse group of majors including Computer Science, Mechanical, Chemical, Biomedical, Civil, Architectural, Industrial, Management, and Electrical and Computer Engineering. It is always interesting to see the different internships that brothers receive for summer break. The following are descriptions of internships that brothers of Pi lota worked this past summer.

Brother Reed Gontarek '16 worked for Polaris Industries in Roseau, Minnesota. This small town on the Canadian-Minnesota border is the company's founding place and the only Polaris Snowmobile line in the world. I was fortunate enough to work directly with that line in a Lean Materials role. In this role, I was involved in waste reduction and productivity increase along the entirety line. This led to a cost savings of \$330,000 annually for the plant.

Brother Andrew Mokotoff '17 and Barrett Wolfson '18 worked at Bit9 + Carbon Black, a cutting edge cyber security company based out of Waltham,

Massachusetts. Mokotoff discovered a significant vulnerability in Carbon Black's Linux sensor and created a kernel level tamper protection to remove this vulnerability. Wolfson dramatically decreased the loading times of the Carbon Black's user interface by adding custom JavaScript code to selectively load specific templates.

Brother Brendan Connolly '16, a senior Management Engineering major, worked at Mack Technologies in Westford, MA over the past summer. Connolly was the Operations Intern and worked with the VP, Supply Chain Manager, Program Managers, Buyers, Sellers, and the production floor to implement Lean Manufacturing techniques.


Brother Tony DiBiasio, a junior majoring in Mechanical Engineering, worked at Phoenix Inc. in Seekonk, MA. At Phoenix, Tony assisted in the modeling of parts that would go into large manufacturing machines. Tony designed parts, assemblies, and drawings for turning, drilling, and milling machines. Tony worked alongside Pi lota brothers Geordie Folinas '13 and Alex Segala '12 who currently work at Phoenix.

Fernando helped design a robotic arm to pick up and place recycled aluminum blocks onto pallets.

The Military Friends Foundation is a group of military members whose sole purpose is to come together to honor and remember our fallen comrades while raising funds to support their families and service members in times of need. On April 15, 2013, the Tough Ruck members were on the finish line of Boston Marathon with the

Tough Ruck volunteers & Gold Star Father Carlos Arredondo just before the horrific bombings occurred. The Tough Ruck joined the first responders to aid those injured in the blasts and exemplified the best of what our military has to offer. Since that year, the Tough Ruck has been held at Minuteman National Park in Lexinaton and Concord, Massachusetts where the first shots of the Revolutionary War were fired. I carried a 45lb ruck sack the 26.2 miles of the Boston Marathon in 7 hours

and 15 minutes and earned a Marathon medal. To honor the fallen, I carried the names of six Pi Iota Fiji's who gave their lives in service during World War II and that of a friend, PVT Jesse McNally. This event challenged my physical and mental stamina, but with persistence I found the strength to dig deep and press on to represent myself, my comrades in arms, and the names I carried on my back.

Rush FIJI 2015


